DIVISION 1 - FLORAL ART

An exhibit is composed of NATURAL plant material, with or without accessories, wholly contained in the specified space in the Show Schedule. No entries Classes 1-4 last year, titles unchanged!

- 1 Harvest Festival – flowers, fruit and vegetables. An exhibit 60cm wide, 60cm deep, height unlimited.
- 2 Chrysanthemums and/or dahlias in a basket. An exhibit 60cm wide, 60cm deep, height unlimited
- 3 The colours of autumn. An exhibit 45 cm wide, 45cm deep, height unlimited
- 4 A floral cushion. An exhibit 20cm wide, 20cm deep, height unlimited
- 5 A miniature in a seashell. An exhibit 10cm wide, 10cm deep, 10cm height

The Redwood Bowl will be awarded to the best exhibit in Classes 1 – 5.

The Stanley Dean Cup will be awarded to the highest aggregate score for Classes 1 –5.

DIVISION 2 - DAHLIAS

NB A range of containers will be available for setting up exhibits for Classes 6– 30.

- 6 3 blooms, NOT more than 220mm diameter of cactus or semi-cactus, any one variety
- 7 3 blooms of decorative, any one variety
- 8 3 blooms of pom-pom, any one variety. Blooms must pass through a 52mm ring without touching
- 9 3 stems of any variety of dahlia other than Classes 6, 7 and 8
- 10 1 single stem of any dahlia variety

The Palmers Perpetual Challenge cup will be awarded to best entry in Classes 6 - 10.

The Oliphant Perpetual Silver Challenge Cup will be awarded to highest aggregate score for Classes 6 - 10.

DIVISION 3 - OTHER FLOWERS

- 11 Marigold – 5 stems
- 12 Herbaceous perennials, a vase to include 3 different kinds, 2 of each
- 13 Summer flowers, a vase of 5 different flowers
- 14 Sweet peas, a vase of 5 annual stems
- 15 Roses, a vase containing at least 3 blooms of one or more varieties
- 16 Rose, a vase containing a single specimen
- 17 Rose, cluster, a single spray of Floribunda or Polyantha
- 18 Rose, a single stem judged on perfume (please name variety, if known!)
- 19 Japanese Anemone, a vase of 3 stems
- 20 Nasturtiums, a vase of 5 stems
- 21 Ornamental grasses and or sedges in a container/vase
- 22 Violas or pansies, a vase of 5 stems
- 23 Gladiolus, a single spike of any variety in a container
- 24 Cut flower a single specimen or spike (excluding dahlias, roses and gladioli)
- 25 Flowering shrub, a single stem, includes Fuchsias but NOT roses or hydrangeas
- 26 Hydrangea, a single head, any variety
- 27 Sunflower head, displayed in a vase or flat on table
- 28 Rudbeckia, a vase of 3 stems of any one variety, annual or perennial
- 29 A vase of 3 stems of any flower not specified above
- 30 Floating flowers (bowl not to exceed 23cm (9in))

Medal dated July 1855 presented by Bridport Horticultural and Cottage Garden Improvement Society for Roses. Gifted to us and first presented in 2019 to be awarded for the best exhibit in Rose Classes 15-18

The Northover Perpetual Trophy will be awarded to the best exhibit in Rose Class 15.

The C W Groves Bowl will be awarded to the highest aggregate for Classes 11 - 30.

DIVISION 4 - POT PLANTS

- 31 One flowering pot plant, excluding fuchsia (pot not to exceed 20cm in diameter)
- 32 One flowering fuchsia (pot not to exceed 20cm in diameter)
- 33 A hanging basket using a 2 litre milk carton
- 34 Bonsai, one plant
- 35 One pot or pan of cactus/cacti or succulent/s (pot or pan not to exceed 30cm in diameter)
- 36 Groves Challenge. Fuchsia plant available at Spring Show 30 March 2019. Max pot size 20cm (8")

The Greenham Cup will be awarded for the best pot plant in Classes 31 – 36.

DIVISION 5 - FRUIT

All fruit MUST be displayed on a plain white plate.

- 37 3 dessert apples of any one variety. (Please state name of fruit, if known)
- 38 3 culinary apples of any one variety (Please state name of fruit, if known)
- 39 3 pears (Please state name of fruit, if known)
- 40 3 stone fruit
- 41 One dish of soft fruit, 12 berries with stalks or 6 sprigs
- 42 One dish of one kind of any other fruit

The Fowler cup will be awarded to the highest aggregate for Classes 37-42.

DIVISION 6 - VEGETABLES

- 43 3 White potatoes
- 44 3 Coloured potatoes
- 45 1 Onion, the heaviest
- 46 3 Onions, 250g each or less
- 47 3 Onions over 250g each, excluding exhibition
- 48 Onions. Rope of 15 onions – not to exceed 3.2kgs
- 49 3 carrots, any variety, foliage trimmed to 75mm
- 50 2 peppers or 5 chillies displayed on a plate
- 51 5 shallots, not to exceed 30 mm in diameter
- 52 5 shallots over 30 mm in diameter
- 53 5 climbing or dwarf French beans, any variety, with stalks
- 54 5 Runner beans with stalks
- 55 1 Runner bean to be judged on length, with stalk
- 56 3 Beetroot with 75 mm approx of leaf stalk attached
- 57 3 Tomatoes with calyces, excluding cherry tomatoes
- 58 5 Cherry tomatoes with calyces still attached, in sand on a white (paper) plate
- 59 A matching pair of courgettes not exceeding 150 mm
- 60 One large courgette/marrow/pumpkin, judged on weight
- 61 One cucumber, frame or ridge
- 62 A pair of matching squash
- 63 Harvest Home – A collection of mixed fruit and vegetables 18" (456mm) overall
- 64 Collection of 4 varieties of vegetables, one of each (no tomato)
- 65 Collection of 6 varieties of vegetables, one of each (may include one tomato)
- 66 Collection of 6 different kinds of herbs
- 67 A Dish of Edible Flowers, e.g. Nasturtium, Borage, Pot Marigold, etc. To be judged on presentation, colour and freshness
- 68 5 bulbs of garlic – displayed in sand on white (paper) plate
- 69 Pot of mixed salad leaves (pot not to exceed 20cm in diameter)

The Colin Sparkes Cup will be awarded to the best entry in Classes 43 – 69.

The Bridport News Challenge cup will be awarded to the highest aggregate score for Classes 43 - 69.

DIVISION 7 - ART & HANDICRAFT

No exhibits to have been shown previously in Bridport Gardening Club's shows.

- 70 A painting, in oil/acrylic, any subject.
- 71 An artwork in other medium, any subject

- 72 A decorated glass jar
- 73 Five Christmas tree decorations made from recycled items/material.
- 74 Knitted or crochet item
- 75 Oven glove/s

The Samways cup will be awarded to the highest aggregate score in Classes 70 - 75.

DIVISION 8 - HOMECRAFT Preserves and Cookery

PRESERVES

*Plain jars must be used for showing preserves, trade names are not acceptable. **NEW** twist top lids are used for showing. No wax disc is needed under a twist top. (NB We have some new lids available from Ann Brown 01308 424055 They need to be used when making the preserve, so it 'pops' when opened by the Judge proving it is "preserved"). Jars should be clean, well filled, labels plain, stating content and dated.*

- 76 One jar of strawberry jam
- 77 One jar of soft-fruit jam (not strawberry)
- 78 One jar of stone fruit jam
- 79 One jar of jelly
- 80 One jar of mature chutney (please state main ingredients used)
- 81 One jar of pickled vegetables
- 82 One jar of mincemeat (conventional or vegetarian, please state which)

COOKERY

Use your own recipes except where provided. All exhibits to be presented on a plain white/paper plate and displayed in clear plastic bags – these will be provided for staging, if required. No liners on cakes unless specified in recipe.

- 83 A hummus dip, plain or flavoured
- 84 **Seeded spelt loaf:** Pre-heat oven to 200°C. **Ingredients:** 500g Wholemeal/WhiteSpelt; 150g Mixed seeds (plus some extra for topping) ;10-12g dried active yeast or 32-34g fresh yeast (use a little more yeast if using wholemeal flour) ½ tsp salt, 500ml water.
Method: Mix all dry ingredients together, dissolve the fresh yeast in warm water (dried yeast can be added to the dry mix) and mix well with the water. It's a very wet dough, more like a cake mix but that's how it should be. Brush a loaf tin with olive oil, fill with the mixture, brush top with Olive oil and sprinkle extra seed on top. Place in pre-heated oven for 1 hour then take out of the tin and put loaf back in for another 5-10min.
- 85 Five potato cakes
- 86 Five Fruit scones – be inventive!
- 87 **Courgette and raisin tea cake:** **Ingredients:** 200g/7oz light muscovado sugar; 4 large eggs (separated); 200g/7oz finely grated raw courgette; 1 lemon finely grated zest and juice; 100g/3.5oz raisins; 100g/3.5oz ground almonds; 200g/7oz self-raising flour; pinch fine sea salt; 1tsp ground cinnamon; ½tsp nutmeg. Butter or oil for greasing.
Method: Preheat oven 170°C/gas mark 3/340° F. Lightly grease loaf tin, about 20cmx10cm/8"x4" and line with baking parchment. Using an electric whisk beat the sugar and egg yolks together for 2-3 minutes, until pale and ½creamy. Lightly stir in the grated courgette, lemon zest and juice, raisins and ground almonds. Sift the flour, salt and spices together over the mixture and then fold them in using a large metal spoon. In a large clean bowl, beat the egg whites until they hold soft peaks. Stir a heaped tablespoonful of the egg white into the cake mixture to loosen it a little, then fold in the rest as lightly as you can. Tip the mixture into the prepared loaf tin and gently level the surface, Bake for about 1 hour, or until an inserted skewer comes out clean. Leave to cool in the tin for 10 mins, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.
- 88 An Animal Cake – judged on decoration only
- 89 Five Custard tarts

The Walker Cup will be awarded to the best entry in the Classes 76 – 89.

The Salon Culinare Salver will be awarded to the exhibitor with the highest aggregate score in Classes 76 – 89.

DIVISION 9 - PHOTOGRAPHY

Colour or monochrome, all photos must have been taken in the last 5 years and must not have been exhibited previously in the Club's shows. Digital or conventional photographs are allowed but it should be what the photographer saw through the viewfinder. Removing objects, making composites, or pasting new objects is not acceptable. Photo and mount, if used, should not exceed 20 x 15 cm.

- 93 Four pictures beginning with "F", labelled
- 94 Waters Edge
- 95 Wild flowers

The Deakin Trophy will be awarded for best photograph in Classes 90 – 95.

The P E Payne Memorial Trophy will be awarded to the exhibitor with the highest aggregate of points in Classes 90 - 95

DIVISION 10 - CHILDREN'S CLASSES *Please Note: Children's exhibits are also welcomed in classes 1-95*

Entries can be made by individuals, groups, classes and schools and will be judged in two groups 5-8 year olds and 9-11 year olds.

- 96 A frightening face mask
- 97 An animal made from fruit and or vegetables
- 98 A Castle for a princess made from recycled materials

OVERALL SHOW WINNERS

The Bob Mills Memorial Cup will be awarded to the exhibitor with the highest overall aggregate score

The E M Page Perpetual Challenge Cup will be awarded to the runner up.

SHOW REGULATIONS

An exhibitor cannot make more than two entries in the same class

Unless otherwise stated in the schedule, two or more persons may not exhibit separately in the same class from the same garden.

Please Note the additional entry method. All entry forms must be in by 7 pm on the Wednesday before the Show, and the Committee reserves the right to accept or reject any entry. Entries can be made by email as an attachment by 5 pm (to allow printing etc.) to ashgrove@talk21.com and payment made on collection of exhibitors cards. Please bring correct amount!

The place of the exhibition will be open to receive exhibits on the evening before the Show from 6 pm till 8 pm and from 8.30 am till 10.15 am on the morning of the Show, after which time no specimen can be received. All exhibitors must leave the hall by 10.15 am when judging will commence.

The Committee will take all ordinary care of the plants, fruit or flowers exhibited, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage which may occur. The Committee will not accept responsibility for any exhibits left in the Hall after 4.00 pm.

Exhibits are not to be removed from the Show until the trophy presentations are complete.

JUDGING

Judging will be conducted under the relevant National Code of Rules. Varieties bearing names not included in the respective National Registers, or any supplements thereto shall not be eligible for exhibition in competition classes.

PRIZES, ETC.

In all Classes the first prize will be £2.00, second prize £1.00, and third prize 50 pence.

Protest or objections to the qualifications of an exhibitor or his exhibit must be made in writing before 2pm on the day of the Show and a deposit of 25p lodged with the Show Coordinator. The deposit will be forfeit to funds if the Club consider the objection frivolous.

The Show subcommittee, whose decision shall be final, shall determine any question not covered by the foregoing rules.

All trophies to be returned at least one month before the respective show.
